- What would excite you about God's 'vision' for us in next few years?



Firstly, it seemed from the day that there is still a lot of "traction" within the overall vision at St Michael's. Discipleship, Outreach and Service still seemed to accurately 'frame' what God was calling us to. Secondly, there was much to celebrate within the life of the Church. These thoughts have been captured in a 21 page "post it note" document which can be available from the Church office.

The implications from our day of prayer and reflection was a sense that the Lord was saying: Improve how we 'reach' people, strengthen how we 'teach' people and resource how we can 'release' people.

Outreach in 2018

Summary verse: Acts 2:46 "The Lord added daily to their number those who were being saved."

The leaders at St Michael's sense there is a need for 'outreach' not drag-in! More explicit sharing of our faith through witnessing, through evangelistic events, through communities, especially new housing areas.

As a result of this in 2018 there will be *m*ore evangelistic events in the auditorium (Steve Legg, a Christian comedy magician in Oct 18, Christmas Comedy show etc). We aim to discover ways to engage with our local community, develop partnerships with others in Student work, new housing areas, church planting initiatives etc.

God calls us to provide support in the issues that are faced by people in our community... debt, isolation & loneliness, relationship breakdown, addictions, mental health, bereavement etc.

We have expanded and upgraded the resources we already have, in order to accommodate future growth in the Church and local population and increase our ability to serve the community, both locally and regionally.

Our four Ambitions within the project have been:

- Building a large, new, multi-purpose church and community centre
- Refurbishing the church building
- Upgrading the Old School Rooms
- Mission and outreach making a difference in other communities in need, by giving to projects in the UK and overseas

The St Michael's Centre has been open for three years now and it has been really good Chair of SMCC Trustees to get used to the space. Slowly, over the two years of operations, we have seen the usage go up, rentals increase and the community be served more effectively.

Last year, we appointed Andy Mead as Events Facilitator and Administrative Assistant for the centre. Bookings have increased and more events have taken place in the centre. My thanks to Andy and lan for their hard work this year.

So, what next? This year we continue to focus on what it will take to complete the project that God has led us into.

Our priorities will be something like this:

Make sure we are repaying our loans successfully.

- I Complete the office suite upstairs.
- 2 Complete the seminar rooms/Kitchen along the Arches corridor
- 3 Continue the works in the Church, including tower refurbishment
- 4 Carry out essential repairs to the Old School Rooms.

It has been good to welcome lan Taylor to the Management Committee as Secretary, following his appointment as Operations Director. An important aspect of his initial focus has been to bring some consistency of approach to key policies across the different ministry areas in church.

Children and Parents

We currently have nearly 100 children in our care. It is an absolute joy to see them grow and develop as they move through the Nursery and Pre-School. A real highlight (for children, parents and staff!) came in March when we once again played host to some 'Living Eggs' and were able to watch with delight little fluffy chicks hatch and grow. The children are also really enjoying the new colourful rubber flooring in courtyard, marked out with a race-track, hopscotch etc. The children love going across to church with Karen Needham (Vice Chair) to have stories and do crafts, and our Nativity, Easter and Leavers services are always a highlight - for everyone!

Relationships with parents have also been strengthened through our Parent Forums, a Wine & Cheese evening and Coffee morning. A Mother's Day breakfast and free bacon butties in honour of Father's Day at the annual Fun Day (Teddy Bear's Picnic), together with a 'Stay and Play' session to support Children in Need have all been well supported and received.

A dedicated website and Facebook page to keep parents informed and up to date with news and forthcoming events, and the introduction of 'Tapestry', a web-based system for doing reports and observations, which parents can readily access at any time, have also proved very popular.

Looking ahead

One of our priorities for the coming year will be to establish a 'rising 3s' room in the Butterfly area upstairs for the children coming up from Caterpillars to help support their transition. We will also be having some significant expenditure on outdoor painting work, which is planned for the summer. The end of April will mark our 10 year anniversary of moving the Pre-School across to the Old Vicarage and extending the provision to include all-day, all-year round Nursery care. It has been an adventure in faith from the start! God has always been faithful in providing what is needed to resource this wonderful ministry, for which we give Him thanks and praise. We are also hugely grateful to members of the Church for their practical and prayerful support.

Old School Rooms Coffee Shop

As the Coffee Shop heads into its' fifteenth year of ministry, it is for many a place to get a cup of coffee, and for others it is also a less daunting way to start to find out more about God and Christianity.

The friendly atmosphere of the Coffee Shop has encouraged many new faces to use the space. This is due to the volunteers and staff who make everyone feel welcome.

In 2017 the Coffee Shop sold over 20,000 drinks and 15,000 snacks and lunches. There have been extremely busy times, especially over the lunch period!

There has been refurbishment of the floor and cupboards that were damaged by flood water. The Coffee Shop is very grateful to Dave Carey, and all those who helped remove all the furniture from the room before Christmas, and put it back after.

Financially, the Coffee Shop did not require any additional financial assistance from the PCC.

In 2018 there will be changes to the staff team, and new initiatives will be launched.

However, the future of the Coffee Shop will still depend on finding enough volunteers to run it. A film promoting the role of volunteers has been made and can be found on the church website.

Sharing Fund

The Sharing Fund was set up in February 1993 as a way of providing financial support to local people in genuine need. The fund is administered by the Clergy and Church Wardens, and details of gifts and loans remain confidential.

In allocating money the following priorities are born in mind: -

- Members of the church in financial need.
- b) Help for Christian development and training such as a Church Weekend or training course.
- c) Any case of extreme need in the Parish especially when that need is identified through the caring ministry of a member of St Michael's.

As we move on into our 27 years since we were sponsored by St. Michael's Church on 6 June 1991 we have had another successful year for the group. We focus on earning badges, teaching new skills and having fun. We camp twice a year, and take part in other activities like archery, rifle shooting and many others. 108 young people regularly attend, between the ages 6-14 years, alongside our 27 adult leaders.

Camps already in planning for this year, a group camp in May at Tintern and a summer camp for Cubs and Scouts at Brownsea Island in July and an autumn camp in October location to be advised.

We also offered places to those on our waiting list for Beavers, Cubs and Scouts. Currently we have 38 Beaver age (6) and 73 names of cub age (8), and I of scout age. However most importantly we do need to expand the size of the group by opening a second Cub Pack this will only be achieved if we recruit more leaders. Beavers and Cubs meet on Mondays and Scouts meet on Wednesdays in the Old School Rooms. The second Beaver Colony and second Scout troop meet at St Michael's School on Wednesdays. We have links with the Solar Explorer Scout Unit who last year enjoyed several camps and hikes in support of the Duke of Edinburgh award and Young Leader schemes. These Young Leaders help in all sections of the group and are a valuable support.

All our leaders are trained to a high standard. We have had a number of our leaders complete their training and have received their Wood badges which represent the completion of their training. My congratulations go to them all.

And, finally we need more help in leading these sections, as well as support roles with the executive committee. If you can help, please get in touch with any of the section leaders or myself.

Building on the popularity and success of the Over 65s community lunches and teas, which happen 4 and 2 times a year respectively, we have been giving some consideration to what 'next-steps' we might take in developing this important ministry.

Our vision is that those we meet, greet and serve should feel valued by and part of the church. We have contact with well over 100 'over-65s', the majority of whom are not regular church goers.

To coincide with the last couple of lunches, we have produced a newsletter highlighting areas of church life that might be of interest to guests – for example, the Community Library, Link Club, Coffee Shop, Monday Men's Group etc. This does appear to have had a positive impact on take-up and involvement.

Our aim in the coming months is to do some market research to see what other activities might be welcomed. In particular, we are keen to establish some 'stepping stones' so that those who are interested in exploring 'something more' in the Christian faith know what is on offer. The presence and commitment of Jack and Ruth McGinley has been a huge blessing and encouragement in developing this whole area of ministry.

Oversight of the lunches is in a time of transition but we are very grateful to Sue Woodhead-Marsh and Jean Allchorne who have been 'chief cooks' since the start, and to Liz Reed who has 'held the reins' of organizing the lunches for the last 18 months. Claire Jessopp continues to organize the teas where guests are treated to beautifully presented hand-cut sandwiches and homemade scones and cakes. A willing team of volunteers (ranging from young to slightly older!) give their time, energy and enthusiasm in a way that really makes a difference.

Singing the hymns is a favourite with the residents and even those suffering from dementia seem to come alive when they hear the music.

Once a month on a Thursday morning a small team go into the home and hold a shortened Communion Service. Again the presence of the Lord and the many blessings received as faith is kindled and strengthened is very evident.

The team is led by Julie Bradley but this year we had to cope with Julie being on a three-month sabbatical from April to June. Thanks to some good forward planning, wonderful support from Jack McGinley with the Communion services, and our dedicated team of volunteers, (and of course much prayer) we survived.

Yet again we thank God for the privilege of sharing His word in this area of our community and for the wonderful pastoral opportunities that arise out of it, particularly supporting the residents and their families with 'end of life' care.

Sunday Morning

Our vision for Sunday Club is to have fun together while growing in our relationship with God. We see this as a vision for leaders and children alike and we are lucky to have a fabulous team of 43 people who all have different skills but all have a real heart for growing their relationship with the children they work with and with God. When I chat to the team what I love is they are often sharing what kids have said or done in the session, which has helped their faith grow.

Saplings

Saplings meets each Friday morning during term time at Wallscourt Farm Academy, Cheswick. It is a playgroup for parents/carers and preschool children and has about 30 families attending regularly. It is a friendly fun group that brings local families together and helps new families to the area meet each other. The sessions run from 9.15 to 11am and provide craft activities, general play opportunities, singing and story time as well as refreshments! There is a small team of hard working dedicated helpers from St Michael's each week that make the group happen and who get to know the families that attend. It is hoped we can run a parenting course in 2018. We are grateful to Wallscourt Farm Academy for allowing us to use their community room each week and to host a Christmas event for Cheswick that St Michael's organised. The Boston Tea Party has been very welcoming when the group has met there when the school has had an inset day or was closed due to snow.

This experience was so significant it was a catalyst for one member of our youth group choosing to be **baptised** in November.

A particular encouragement from the past 12 months has been the way young people are feeling supported and equipped in using their gifts to serve the wider church. Wider Bristol Work

St Michael's pays a key part in serving and resourcing the wider youthwork scene over the next few years. across Bristol. We lead the Bristol Youthwork Forum, a group of around 60 youthworkers from around the city which meet 3 times a year to resource each other and plan how best to work together. We are on the leadership team for Hope Bristol, a 5 day city-wide mission aiming to show God's love in practical ways, with 450 young people signed up to make a difference in our city (180 of which are coming from across the country.) We are also on the leadership team for The Mix, a worship celebration that meets 4 times a year for teenagers across the region, enabling young people to meet and become like Jesus.

Back in June, we received an emergency phone call from a Bristol based, secure educational unit asking for help. They were hosting a visiting speakers day for the inmates and had a last minute withdrawal with 24 hours to go. Using our links to the Bristol Youthwork Forum, we were able to put together a team of youth workers, led by ourselves, and a programme to deliver to 60 students. Since then, this has enabled local youth workers to revisit the unit to deliver long term mentoring to inmates.

Marriage Ministry

Last year 5 couples enrolled on the **Marriage Preparation Course**, which ran for 5 weeks from January to March. The evenings begin with a meal where guests enjoy chatting with each other about their wedding plans. However, these groups aren't co-ordinated or managed, they generally happen organically with three like-minded people deciding to meet together on a regular basis. We would be happy to talk to anyone who has any questions about how to set one of these groups up.

Parenting Teenagers Course

Rachel Hepburn finished her role as community worker in August 2017 which left a gap in the community and school.

However, Saplings playgroup continues to grow on Fridays in term time at Wallscourt Academy. A small team from St Michael's help at this each week and some good relationships with parents and carers are developing.

At Christmas we held a carol event at Wallscourt Academy and some of the school children, Saplings families, Beavers, and residents from Beaufort Grange came. The Open the Book team told the Christmas story which was enjoyed by all who came.

We plan to run a parenting course in the summer term for parents in Cheswick.

A monthly "Songs of Praise" event at Beaufort Grange Care Home has started and this is proving popular with the residents. Once every three months Holy Communion is offered. The event is run by the Cheswick Lifegroup.

A block of new retirement flats is now occupied, and as a result of delivering St Michael's Christmas cards in the flats, the Cheswick Life Group was invited to lead some carol singing in the lounge where there is a quality grand piano. Around 50 residents attended and we hope we can offer more events for those residents.

In March, there was an invitation from Wallscourt Academy for us to lead an assembly about the plight of children attending schools under trees in a refugee camp in Uganda. This was well received by staff and children and the school wants to form a link with such a school which will be set up in the spring.

We are looking at ways to make the community at Cheswick aware of the activities at St Michael's and are working on a welcome leaflet to put through the doors of the next batch of houses under construction in Cheswick. We can also use social media to advertise events. We would also love to lay on community events relating to different Christian seasons but our team is small and we need help from other members of St Michael's to manage this! The opportunities are clearly there.

In September 2017 we ran our first Parenting Teenagers course. The vision behind it was that I wanted to go on one.... and – of course – we wanted to serve our community here in Stoke Gifford. And we did just that.

There were 11 families of all different shapes and sizes represented: 4 of them were not connected with St Michael's, 2 were on the fringes, and the other 5 were part of our regular church family. Using the material from Care for the Family, 5 leaders (some of us with teenagers and some of us who have lived to tell the tale) took it in turns to host the sessions and to lead the small group discussions.

The feedback was unanimously positive. The main outcome was that now parents knew they weren't on their own; that there were others going through the same thing, however bad it felt. And we've made people welcome and given them a positive experience of what church can be.

We are hoping to run this course at least once a year, and probably in the autumn. In the past we have also run courses for parents of primary school children; we are hoping to do this again – and that this too will become an annual occurrence.

The Peace and Hope Trust provides healthcare, educational equipment, buildings and pastoral work to poor communities in Nicaragua. The Deanery link with a Ugandan Diocese enables students to access tertiary theological education in Uganda.

In Bristol, our support has helped ministries reaching out to homeless and vulnerable people (Crisis Centre Ministries and Emmaus) and to refugees and asylum seekers (b.friend). People have been enabled to seek help through counselling (Network). Children and young people have grown in faith and had fun during holidays at Upcott.

Mission trips

There were two mission trips in 2017. A team of six people went to Gotesti, Moldova to help run a children's holiday Bible club, participate in church services and visit church members and others in their homes. A team of 12 young people and leaders went to Uganda to see the outreach projects of churches in our linked Diocese of Ruwenzori, to visit schools, hospitals and charities and to participate in a youth conference and services at several churches.

Mission Support Group

News from our mission partners is circulated regularly to members of St Michael's Mission Support Group for information and prayer. This group currently has 18 members, comprising all the link people for our mission partners and others interested in mission. Administrative functions are undertaken by a few core members of MAG.

The group met twice during the year to share updates and, at the winter meeting, to review our support for our mission partners, as circumstances change over time. It was decided that the time had come for our financial support for Emmaus Bristol to end.

New mission partner

Mission at St Michael's involves sharing in the ministry of our mission partners overseas and in From January 2018, we started supporting a new mission partner, The Brickworks, which is the UK, by building relationships, visiting wherever possible and providing financial, practical working with the Anglican Church in South Sudan and in refugee camps in Northern Uganda and prayer support. Men's Ministry

During the year we have continued to develop the men's strategy, and focussed on encouraging men to start coming to church and/or to deepen their relationship with God.

The approach has continued with social events but has now been enhanced with faith talks to meet the needs of those men who already come to church. This year we have organised 9 events (from a sports quiz to build a burger) and 2 faith talks with over 350 men attending in total. In order to ensure we are not just attending to men's faith needs we have taken the opportunity to host events that include women.

Our approach over the next year will be to focus on Life Skills (that is men using their skills to provide talks and support to the wider community) and continue with a monthly social event and quarterly faith talks. Although Men's Ministry Dad's with Kids events have not proven to be that successful we are looking to try out some family orientated events as well. The first being a petanque competition on the green. That being said, the breakfast club run for dad's and Kids has proved its worth and continues to run monthly.

Men's Friday Night Football

We have a starting age of 16 and no upper age limit. It is open to church and non church members. I send out details regarding football each week to over 70 email addresses Players are asked to reply to the email confirming they are playing that week (as we have a maximum limit of 40 players), so far this season lowest turnout has been 17 players while the highest turnout was 38. I would say that just over half of the players attend St Mike's while the other half are family, friends and neighbours of members of St Mike's.

We play each week during football season (September- June) at Abbey Wood community school, Stoke Gifford (on the outside Astroturf pitch). between 20:00-21:00 every Friday evening (in all weathers!!), players are charged £3.00 each to play which covers the payment for the hire of the football pitch and lost footballs etc.

At the end of season (in June) we all get together (in the OSR). The aim is to allow men to get together each week and enjoy playing a game of football, in a friendly and sportsman like way, and when we are playing football to encourage and praise each other but most of all to play the game with a smile on our faces and have fun together.

Fabric Committee

During the past year the Fabric committee has been primarily focused on:-

- Appointing a church architect, tasking him to compile and present a specification for the refurbishment of the tower
- Requesting authorisation ('B' notification) from the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) to commence remedial works on the tower
- -Applying to the DAC for permission to remove the bells from the tower and display in the new centre
- -Investigating the best method for preserving the Bell frame
- -Upgrading the Church electrical installation
- -Obtaining quotes for the installation of electronic bells
- -The red book has recently been updated and will be maintained by the Church Wardens in consultation with the Fabric Committee.

The DAC did not grant permission for the removal of the bells from the tower. The time taken to prepare and submit this application delayed the repair of the tower, this is now due to commence late April. Once complete we will able to make the bells safe by lowering them to the bell pit and apply a preservative coat to the Belfry timbers.

A fault in the church wiring led to the upgrading of the church electrical distribution box followed by a complete rewiring the power supply to the audio visual desk.

This March/April we are due to have the statutory Quinquennial inspection so the FC are holding off all other works until the report is submitted. This will provide most of our focus for the next 12 months. None of the above includes various works done by the committee such as maintaining the boundary hedge, ad hoc work in the church, looking at possible grants to partially cover the costs of future projects and meeting up with contractors to discuss works both current and future.

Looking beyond the next 12 months, we hope to be able to focus on achieving one of the main ambitions of the Heart of the Community Project – 'to restore our historic church building for generations to come'.

Finance Report

Firstly a huge thank you to everyone who gave to the work of God at St Michael's Church during 2017. Whilst we were expecting a deficit last year, we had an amazing response to our Gift Day which resulted in an overall £12,100 surplus for 2017. However, 2017 was not without its challenges. Firstly, we continue to be overly reliant on ad-hoc gifts, especially at Gift Day. Whilst we are incredibly grateful for the generosity of people at Gift Day, it would make budgeting and planning a bit easier if more of our income was received monthly. Secondly, the loss of 4 regular donors resulted in a loss of about £30k in regular giving in 2017. It's my hope and prayer that everyone who feels that St Michael's is their home church would feel that they are able to contribute to the ministry and operations of St Michael's.

There are a number of people who ensure that the finances of St Michael's are run tightly and effectively. Chris Bradley was Treasurer for the first 15 weeks of 2017 and I was blessed to have such a supportive, wise and diligent predecessor. I would like to express my sincere thanks to Alison Volkmer (Financial Controller) who manages the day-to-day finances of the PCC and has done a great job of improving our financial systems and handling our monthly finances with dedication and thoroughness. I would also like to say a big thank you to Mandy Love who does an amazing job with the finances at the Pre-School and Nursery (which delivered a surplus in 2017) and to Ann Cooke and Peter Day with their prudent and effective management of the Coffee Shop finances (which also delivered a small surplus in 2017). Finally, my heartfelt thanks to all who serve on the Finance Sub-Committee of the PCC who tirelessly pore over detailed spreadsheets and accounts, to ensure that the finances of St Michael's are run in a way which balances financial prudence with faith in a generous God.
